Message from the Rabbi:

It's a very unusual year. The last days of August are slipping away, Labor Day is upon us, the kids are returning to school, and yet the High Holidays are still a month away (Rosh Hashanah 5785 begins on the evening of October 2)! It's out of the ordinary, even for a Jewish leap year.

But this has been an unusual year from almost the get-go. October 7th - with all the horror that happened on that day and all that it has brought with it - fell on Sh'mini Atzeret/Simchat Torah, the end of last year's High Holiday season. It's been almost a year since the hostages have been in Gaza, almost a year since Israelis from border areas have been evacuated from their homes, almost a year since the war has been raging.

It's been a year where public opinion against Israel has been even worse than usual, a year where college campuses harbored encampments and protests and school administrators defaulted on their responsibilities to contain them, a year where many Jewish students needed to reexamine who their friends really were. It's been a year where the upcoming US presidential election is on everyone's mind. We have let politics divide us and define us, and we must carefully consider what will be the best path forward together for this country we love.

It has been a tough difficult year, Rosh Hodesh Elul falls on September4 this year. Elul is the last month of the Jewish year - the month that is traditionally set aside for preparing ourselves to enter the New Year. It is a month where the shofar Sounds each weekday, saying - "it's comng, get ready".

In Synagogue, during Elul we add Psalm 27 to every service. This year, especially, it hits home - speaking of the safety and protection that we long for. Here are some of its verses:

God is my light and my help, whom should I fear
God is the strength of my life, whom should I dread?

When evil men assail me, to devour me It is they, my enemies who stumble and fall.

Should an army besiege me, my heart will not succumb to fear Should war beset me, still I would be confident.

One thing I ask of God, one thing I truly desire
To live in the house of the Lord, all the days of my life
To feel God's presence and to frequent God's temple.

He will shelter me within His sukkah during terrible times

Grant me the protection of His tent;

Raise me up on a rock, out of reach of disaster.

Teach me Your way, God, guide me to walk straight on Your path despite the turmoil around me. Look to God. Be strong and of good courage. Look to God.

As we enter the month of Elul, a month of contemplation and preparation, let us pray together that the best that humanity can be is able to conquer the worst that humanity can be. Let us pray for peace and kindness - for each of us, for our community, for Israel and for the world.

Shimmy and I wish you and your loved ones a Shana tova u'metuka - a year of sweetness and goodness, a year of joy, health and peace.

Ask Our Rabbi (Sept/Oct 2024)

Q: How does Judaism prove the existence of God?

A: Proof of the existence of God is more in the realm of philosophy than religion. Philosophers study HOW we know WHAT we know. Judaism's great philosopher, Maimonides, offered his own "proof" of God's existence by way of reason. He reasons that the universe is not empty. Therefore, it is dependent on a necessary Being, which is independent of anything else. If this Being is independent from everything else, it derives its existence from itself. Only one Being derives its existence from itself, and that is God. (I am not a philosopher, and what I've written is a big oversimplification of Maimonides' proof.

See Maimonides "Guide for the Perplexed" if you want to know more, but I don't find this philosophical "proving God" process helpful to me).

Overall, Judaism has not concerned itself with "proving" the existence of God. The religious person (person of faith) only needs to look out at the world, and to wonder about the world's existence and design in order to intuit that there is something beyond us that gives order and meaning to life, and that something can be called God. (And, yes, I am a scientist, and I subscribe to Darwinism and the Big Bang, and yet when I look at the world, I feel something bigger and beyond me). Go out into the world. Smell the flowers. Look at the intricacies of the patterns on the leaves. Look into the eyes of your grandchildren. That's all the proof of God I need.
