Message From Our Rabbi

It's that time of year. Daylight savings time will allow daylight to extend an hour later into the evening hours. Shabbat official candle-lighting time jumps an hour later than before. Can spring be far behind? (I hope not!)

The Jewish month that begins on March 10^{th} is Adar Sheni – the second month of Adar. We add a second Adar seven times every 19 months, to keep the calendar in sync with the seasons, making sure Pesach will occur in the spring. In Hebrew, a leap year is referred to as *Shanah Me'uberet*, or "pregnant year".

Purim is coming this month, on the 14th of the month of Adar II, aka March 24th. Since it falls on a Sunday, we will celebrate together in-person at WCJC at 10:30 on that Sunday morning. Together we will read the Megillah (in English) – in parts, as we usually do. We will celebrate with a nosh of Hamantaschen and coffee. Costumes are welcome and noisemakers will be provided.

Mark your calendars for Passover. The first Seder falls on Monday, April 22 this year.

I write this on the 150th day since the Israeli hostages were taken. There is no deal yet, and the situation remains grim. So, I was happy for an opportunity this week, to visit a place that celebrates the richness of Judaism and Jewish heritage, a

reminder that whatever set-backs we experience, AM YISRAEL HAI – the people Israel live!

I visited YIVO – the Institute for Jewish Research, which is based in lower Manhattan. The YIVO Archives contains some 24 million items, including sound and music collections, theater and art collections, communal and personal records, photographs and films, manuscripts, diaries, memoirs, personal correspondence, and much more. YIVO's Library has nearly 400,000 volumes in all European languages and contains the largest collection of Yiddish-language books, pamphlets, and newspapers in the world. It is open to the public, who can do research from its archives, see the many exhibits that are set up utilizing material from the archives, and attend all kinds of adult education (lectures, concerts, conferences) most also available on Zoom. During my visit, I saw a presentation about the Yiddish language in pre-state Israel. Like Yiddish everywhere, the language picked up words from the surroundings, and so the Yiddish spoken in pre-state Israel contained many Arabic words. One of the items on display was a Yiddish-Arabic dictionary.

I learned that there was some Yiddish spoken in pre-state Israel as early as the 1500's. How do we know this? In the Cairo

Geniza was found a letter from a mother in Jerusalem to her son in Cairo written in Yiddish in the 1500s. What did it say? Paraphrasing, "I never hear from you; why don't you write to me?" Some things never change.

YIVO is a treasure that I didn't know much about before my visit. I encourage you to check them out at their website www.yivo.org.

Wishing you and yours a *freilichin* Purim and a *zissen* Pesach.

2024 Mar/Apr Ask Our Rabbi Q: What are the Dead Sea Scrolls

A: The Dead Sea Scrolls were found in caves in the Judean desert, when they were accidentally stumbled upon by a Bedouin boy. Ancient parchments, found preserved in jars, were subsequently dated to be from the period of the Second Temple (520 BCE - 70 CE). They contain writings that are believed to be from a Jewish sect called the Essenes - a sect known for their piety and distinctive theology, that these manuscripts helped us to learn about. Also among the manuscripts were excerpts from Biblical writings, showing that these ancient people had the same texts as we do today.

Some of the Dead Sea Scrolls are on display in the Shrine of the Book at the Israel Museum in Jerusalem. There, one of these ancient scrolls is open to the book of Isaiah. We visited the museum when my kids were

teens, and my son was excited to find that the scroll was open to his Bar Mitzvah haftarah - and he actually chanted the words of his haftarah from the scroll (which was behind glass, of course). What a connection from the present back to ancient Israel!
